#### **Departure Date**

For our **Beautiful Baltics Motorcycle Safari**, you will need to arrange your international flights to arrive in Krakow, Poland by **Monday 8<sup>th</sup> August 2022** as shown above. There are several flight options available with different national carriers; please see further discussion on International Flights herein.

#### **Tour Operator**

This Motorcycle Safari is one of several itineraries offered by **World On Wheels**, Australia's one and only professional tour operator specialising solely in international motorcycle adventures. Operating for 20+ years as *Ferris Wheels*, Mike Ferris pioneered the Himalayan Motorcycle Safari concept in 1994 with his first crossing of the world's greatest mountain range by an Australian group of riders. In 1995, by now a qualified travel agent, he took his first commercial safari to the Khardung La in Ladakh (India), at 5,602 metres the highest road in the world. Mike Ferris now operates and personally leads annual **World On Wheels** motorcycle safaris to diverse destinations such as the Indian Himalaya, Nepal, Bhutan, Rajasthan, Turkey, Morocco, Iceland, the Dalmatian coastline, Mexico-Guatemala-Belize, Peru-Bolivia and the Five Fingers of S E Asia, as well as this one through the Baltic States, all of approximately three weeks in duration.

**Mike Ferris** is the only professional motorcycle tour guide in Australia (and possibly the world?) who is also a fully qualified and government-accredited motorcycle riding instructor.

Be aware that this itinerary is a guide only and may need to change due to weather, road conditions or other factors. Please be flexible, but rest assured your Tour Leader will make the final day-to-day decisions only after consultation with our agent, local authorities and all group members.



### **Package Price**

The Beautiful Baltics tour price, excluding airfares and joining in Krakow, is US\$8,000-00. Pillions are welcome and we also have a limited number of seats available in our support vehicle; price for pillion or passenger is US\$7,500-00. Please note that our prices are subject to foreign exchange fluctuations and <u>we reserve the right</u> to alter any pricing, pursuant to Clause 9 of our Terms and Conditions herewith, up to the date of final payment.

In this itinerary our tour prices are shown in US\$ for greatest stability but we ask for <u>the equivalent</u> in AU\$ at the prevailing daily exchange rate. The website to be used for daily foreign exchange calculations is: <u>www.westpac.com.au/business-banking/services/foreign-exchange-rates/</u> We request a US\$1,000 deposit and will invoice you in US\$ thereafter for the remaining balance, but you have some flexibility as to when to pay. Final payment will be due 60 days before the tour date, but if you choose to pay us say 90 or 120 days beforehand because you feel the forex rate is favourable, this works well for everyone all round.

<sup>1</sup>Accommodation is provided on a twin-share basis and if you're on your own we'll do our best to bunk you in with an acceptable roommate. But if you're the <u>last</u> person to book, there's obviously a 50-50 chance you'll have to take a room on your own and will therefore be liable for the single room supplement. So the moral of the story is, book early or bring your own roommate with you. Or preferably both!

#### **Price excludes**

- Airfares to/from Krakow (allow around Au\$2,000-00 depending on airline)
- Comprehensive travel insurance policy, which must cover use of large-capacity motorbike<sup>2</sup>
- Medical examination and vaccinations before departure (recommended)
- Tipping for local hotel porters and guides
- Road tolls if necessary (we'll try to avoid them as much as possible!)
- Expenses of a personal nature such as postage, laundry, souvenirs and drinks
- Tips for support staff at completion; optional but always appreciated, US\$100-00 suggested <sup>3</sup>

<sup>2</sup> Please note that a motorcycle safari overseas must be considered one of life's more adventurous pursuits and therefore personal travel insurance is <u>mandatory</u>. If you already have existing travel insurance, we will insist on sighting a copy of the policy before you will be permitted to participate in this tour. Or if you prefer, we can help arrange comprehensive travel insurance for you (Australian clients only). **Be aware**, however, that any travel insurance ceases immediately on return to your own country, even if on-going medical treatment or surgery is required. Private health cover or government Medicare resumes at that point.

<sup>3</sup> A note on tips. We recognize tipping is not generally part of the antipodean psyche, but it is pretty much expected in most other parts of the world. Daily hotel porters will expect a small reward for carrying your bags to your room and our mechanic/driver/local guide will anticipate a reasonable tip to supplement his modest wages whilst



on tour. We suggest something like US\$100-00 is affordable for your three weeks (only about US\$5-00 per day), collected at the conclusion of the tour. If you've had a good time, we encourage you to contribute generously!

#### **International Flights**

You will have to arrange your own airfares through your preferred travel agent, or you may wish to take advantage of an arrangement we have with our local agent, Natasha Dann at iTravel. Phone 0402 171 106 or email her at natasha@itravel-au.com and mention you're joining the *World On Wheels* 'Beautiful Baltics' tour; she has a copy of this itinerary and can arrange your route and flights as well as any stopovers or extensions you desire.

We've deliberately designed this tour so most of the flying is done on a weekend. If you fly out of Australia on the Saturday morning you can continue on from Singapore or Bangkok to one of several European capitals, with a connection to arrive in Krakow on the Sunday or Monday. And coming back the other way, unless you decide to extend, you should have enough time to be back in the office on Monday morning. If that's your thing.

#### Food & Health

Quality of food can obviously be a concern when visiting exotic foreign lands. We take care in selecting clean and reputable establishments for our meals and the local fare is not always as fiery and spicy as some people would have you believe. Our clients are often pleasantly surprised by the delicious meals available. Even so, an occasional upset stomach cannot always be avoided in remote areas, so we advise initial caution and we carry various medicines to ensure as much comfort as possible. Participants in any of our adventure activities are obviously expected to have a reasonably high level of health, fitness and capability, but **in all cases a consultation with your doctor is recommended** in order to identify necessary vaccinations and precautions, particularly if traveling overseas for the first time.

#### Climate & Clothing

Our itinerary is designed to take advantage of the pleasant weather of late northern summer. However, the geography is varied and therefore temperatures can range from cold inland to warm on the coast, with some chance of rain. At times there will be little shade available, so sunscreen, sunglasses, hats and sleeves will also be required. Jeans and our *World On Wheels* shirts tend to be the norm, with a jacket, strong boots and riding gloves. Helmets, full or open-faced as you prefer, should be brought from home.

Professional quality riding gear including jackets, over-pants and other protective clothing are an excellent investment and will go a long way to ensuring your comfort and protection in what may sometimes be adverse conditions. In cooler conditions, a versatile and useful Goretex jacket and pants with a zip-in / zip-out padded liner for extra warmth and water proofing. If you're susceptible to the cold, then probably a good set of thermal underwear will also come in handy. A couple of products we've used for several years and are happy to endorse are the Kevlar-reinforced jeans and other clothing from Draggin Jeans in Melbourne (www.dragginjeans.com.au) and those velcro alternatives to hooked 'occy' straps from Andy Strapz (www.andystrapz.com).

And while we're giving plugs, we'd like to suggest you consider a Rider Improvement course, regardless of your experience or perceived ability on a motorcycle, to brush up on your skills prior to joining an international riding safari. Our recommendation here is the renowned operation Stay Upright, who offer a varied range of courses designed to progressively increase your riding ability. Mike Ferris completed his Instructor's course with Stay Upright and works with them on a part time basis. In his spare time!



### **Our Motorbikes**

Our local bike supplier has an extensive range of top-end bikes available, including several models and sizes from BMW, Ducati, Honda and Suzuki; even a Harley Davidson! All bikes are new models and in excellent condition. For the more vertically challenged we are able to make some adjustments to certain bikes to assist in your riding comfort. Fuel, insurance and maintenance are included. Our 'standard' package price includes any bike up to 999cc and there are upgrade options to a 1200cc or larger -- we offer bikes in four different pricing categories; please see our complete list of bikes for details, at the end of this itinerary.

We will attempt to provide you with the bike of your choice, but they may be allocated on a first-booked firstchoice basis and we retain the right of assignment. Our bike provider is a commercial operation and their fleet changes frequently, so your preferred model might not always be available.

Please note, in Krakow you will be required to sign a rental contract with our bike supplier, and leave a photocopy of your passport and a credit card imprint as a security deposit. Our package price includes comprehensive insurance but the policy carries an Excess (or 'Deductible'), depending on the size of the bike; typically  $\leq 1,600$  for a 600/700/800cc and  $\leq 1,800$  for a 1200cc. The rider is liable for this first amount of any damage; be aware that if you drop the bike, <u>any</u> visible damage will be payable by you, they will even charge for a scratch because it diminishes the re-sale value of the bike. Our bike supplier will give you options to further reduce your liability, through payment of an additional premium.

#### Our Riding Policy, and other pertinent information

We will <u>occasionally</u> require riders to bunch up, particularly when navigating through large towns, but out on the open road we know that you will want a lot of freedom and time on your own (isn't that what riding is all about?) We allow plenty of time for people to set their own pace, and it's unlikely that you'll ever be pressed to keep up. We know of some motorbike tour operators who insist that everybody ride in formation every day and play 'follow the leader', but that's not our style at all. You'll be given maps and daily directions on how far we're going, the destination for the night (including hotel name and phone number), and where we are likely to stop for lunch, drink breaks, sightseeing and refueling along the way, etc. There is always plenty of time to take photos, chat to the locals, or just sit and soak it all in. Our support vehicle with our luggage will always be the last vehicle in the convoy, with our mechanic, spare parts and tools, etc. in case of bike problems.

But let's not pull any punches here. A tour such as this is potentially a dangerous undertaking; it's inherent in the very nature of the trip. You'll be on an unfamiliar bike, on unfamiliar roads in unfamiliar traffic conditions; eg right-hand side of the road. It is important for you to recognize this and accept ultimate responsibility, firstly for joining and secondly for riding in a circumspect manner for the duration of the tour. Please read and acknowledge Paragraph 16 of our Terms and Conditions! (End of sermon)

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Some of our tours are more about the daily ride than the nightly destination, eg the Himalayan Heights tour where it's mostly about the exciting roads. This Baltics tour is more about the destinations we visit; ie the capital cities of unique countries which were once part of Soviet Russia and are now part of the European Union. The roads connecting these places may not be the most exciting you've ridden. It's pointless trying to find twisty mountain roads for example, because there aren't any. The highest point in all the Baltics is Estonia's 'Big Egg' Mountain, which rises to the lofty height of 318 metres! So on this tour, we sometimes tend to fast-track it to our daily destinations in order to leave time to explore in the afternoons, and we have a few more non-riding 'rest' days than some of our other itineraries. Many of the Old Town centres are pedestrian-only and a delight to wander around.



Bear in mind also that we're still fine-tuning this new Beautiful Baltics tour. We've been to some of these places, but not to all of them. We will probably get some timing estimates wrong, we will undoubtedly find some hotels are not up to our usual standard, and there could be myriad other things *not quite right* yet.

**Visas:** You will need a visa to enter Russia. We will assist you by providing a Letter of Introduction from our hotel in St. Petersburg, formally inviting you to visit Russia. The Russian embassies are renowned for their lengthy bureaucratic processes, so please give yourself plenty of time to acquire the necessary visas. The embassy will require your passport for approximately 10 days. All the other countries in our itinerary, being European, do not ordinarily require visas for most nationalities.

### **Detailed Daily Itinerary**

**Day 1** will mainly consist of flying, and involves the logistics of getting everyone into Krakow at more or less the same time from several different locations. Our hotel will be located in the heart of the old town, and we'll have a welcoming drink and our first group dinner together while we get to know one another.

**Day 2** At the risk of a harsh introduction, we are going to take a half-day tour of the nearby Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration camp. We believe it's important to recognize what the Polish people (and others) went through during the Nazi occupation of their country in WW2. It's a very sobering but worthwhile experience.

In the afternoon there is free time to also visit the famous salt mines at nearby Wieliczka for those who wish, or simply soak up the atmosphere of Krakow's central district. Our bikes will be available at the hotel in the evening, to give you the opportunity to check them out before we ride.

**Day 3** is our first day on the road, and it's a long one. We ride out of Krakow heading north all day until we reach the Baltic Sea port city of Gdansk. Many of us will remember Gdansk rose to international recognition through the shipyard union movement *Solidarnosc* (Solidarity) in the early 1980's, with its charismatic firebrand leader Lech Walesa. It's now a modern, vibrant and attractive city which still retains much of its *olde worlde* charm.

**Day 4** we have deliberately timed our visit to coincide with St. Dominic's Fair, one of the largest festivals in Europe. The old streets of central Gdansk become a thriving cauldron of artisans and artifacts and street parades for the first two weeks in August



each year. We can be part of the festivities, or you may choose instead to do a quiet walking tour of the Old Town. Here's a useful resource page we have found online: <u>https://wonderfulwanderings.com/things-to-do-in-gdansk/</u>

**Day 5** We head away from the coast, striking through Poland's northern agricultural belt to Augustow. It's a very picturesque little town in a district of lakes and rivers, and we'll find a place for dinner overlooking the canals and waterways which define the town. It's a bit of a domestic tourist destination but the local shops and restaurants love to welcome English-speakers.



**Day 6** We cross the 'border' today to bring us into Lithuania, which is our first of the official Baltic States. The three countries of Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia have close administrative ties with each other in a similar way to the three Benelux countries (Belgium, Netherlands, Luxemburg) and have been through many periods of turmoil and occupation by other powers, most recently of course the communist Soviet Union. All three are now enjoying new-found freedom as fully fledged members of the EU, the Eurozone, and NATO.

**Day 7** The capital city, Vilnius, has a modest population of just over half a million. We'll spend a rest day here in the clean and agreeable city centre, which has lots of open spaces around the central focal point of Cathedral Square. Some interesting options can be found on this webpage:

**Day 8** From Vilnius we cross the border into Latvia, but we'll leave the capital for a little later and head instead to the small town of Rezekne. It's famous of course as the Heart of Latgale – we all knew this, yes? Right in the centre of town is a small hill containing the remains of Rezekne Castle, dating back to the Latgalians of the 9<sup>th</sup> century and affording panoramic views over the town and the small river running through it.

**Day 9** is our first actual border which requires official paperwork, as we cross from Europe into Russia. Please be patient with us as we process the motorbikes and yourselves, and soon enough we should be on our way through the Federation hinterland to the regional city of Pskov.

**Day 10** Rather than taking the direct route to St. Petersburg, we're going to ride up the shores of Lake Peipus for a while. This huge lake frequently freezes over in winter, and in April of 1242 the famous 'Battle On The Ice' took place here between the (Russian) Republic of Novgorod and the Teutonic Knights of the Livornian Order. Google it when you have 15 minutes to spare; it's a fascinating chapter of history probably not many of us in the antipodes has ever been aware of before. Then, inevitably, we have to join the highway congestion into St. Petersburg.



**Day 11** You've seen this place in travel shows and TV doco's but they cannot do it justice; nothing beats seeing it for yourself. The State Hermitage Museum is the largest in the world and houses over three *million* items, including the world's largest collection of paintings. It's actually a complex comprised of six buildings; here's one of them, the Winter Palace. It's big. We'll also take you out of town to visit the almost as splendid Peterhof Palace, often referred to as the 'Russian Versailles'. With gardens full of fountains and gold-leaf statues, it's been faithfully restored to its former glory after being occupied by German troops in WWII, who trashed the place and left it in ruins.



**Day 12** We head off this morning to take the long way round to Estonia. The border town of Narva has a significant place in history, as the Great Northern War between Sweden and Russia started here in 1700. If you're not carrying a Swedish passport we should get through pretty quickly and be on our way to Tallinn.

**Day 13** Tallinn is one of the smallest capitals in the world, and a delightfully quirky little place it is. We can spend a leisurely day here wandering the museums and cathedrals, or relaxing in the central precinct of bars and restaurants. Or, here's an idea for your rest day: nip across to Finland on the ferry, for lunch in Helsinki!

**Day 14** We'll do some more wandering today, as we follow the coastline around Estonia's portion of the Baltic Sea, taking us to a short ferry hop across to the island of Saaremaa. The island's small capital of Kuressaare is famous for its spa resort hotels and indeed we shall avail ourselves; it sounds like a wonderful opportunity to rejuvenate after two weeks in the saddle. If this doesn't appeal to you, there's also the best-preserved medieval castle in the Baltics just a couple of hundred metres from our hotel, which you might want to go and explore; http://kuressaarecastle.ee/index.php

**Day 15** We need to backtrack a few km because there's only one ferry to/from the island. We then stick close to the coast of the Gulf of Riga until we reach its namesake city, the capital of Latvia. There are of course no actual borders here any more, so you may simply spy a sign announcing 'Latvia'.

**Day 16** Another capital with less than a million people and yet the largest city in the Baltics, Riga is known as a cultural and historical centre, where we can wander through this UNESCO World Heritage Site. You'll no doubt remember it for the 2003 Eurovision Song Contest, or perhaps the 2013 World Women's Curling championships... We have a rest day here and one of the options is a pleasant little cruise on the Daugava river, or simply soaking up the atmosphere of the historic city centre; our hotel is of course in the heart of the Old Town.

**Day 17** We head into more rural areas on our way to Bialystok, a pleasant little city in Poland's northeast with palaces, parks, and a vibrant pedestrian-only central area of restaurants and bars. En route we cross huge, extensive tracts of agricultural landscapes as we pass through one of Poland's most productive food bowls.

**Day 18** Heading further south as we wind down the clock on our tour; the eastern city of Lublin actually served briefly as the national capital on two short occasions and has since been deposed, but the Old Town is a wonderful place to wander for a few hours in the afternoon.

**Day 19** We return to Krakow to complete the loop, our final challenge being to navigate this large city, with its sometimes notorious traffic snarls. We'll return to our same hotel, hand back the bike keys, finalise any necessary paperwork, then have a well-earned cold drink or two and our farewell dinner.

**Day 20** Swap addresses with your fellow riders at breakfast so we can all keep in touch and share photos of our happy memories. Don't forget to tell 100 friends how much fun you've had with us in the Beautiful Baltics! See you somewhere else in the world, sometime soon, on two wheels.
